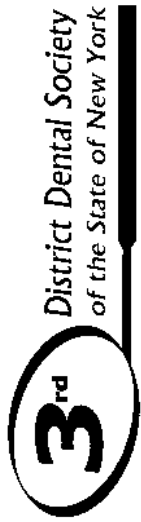
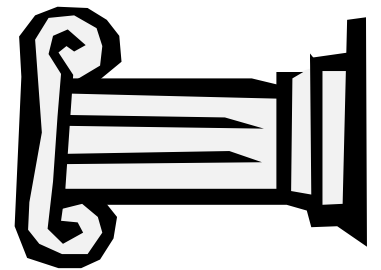

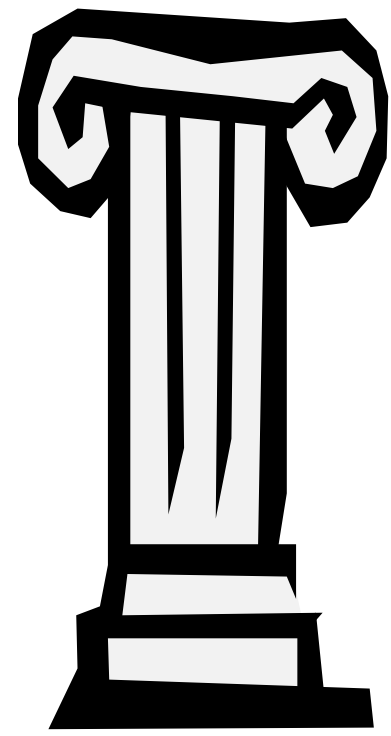

She is a member of the Academy of Osseointegration, a Fellow of the Academy of General Dentistry and a member of 3M-ESPE’s Council for Innovative Dentistry. Dr. Doray is currently an Adjunct Assistant Professor in both the Department of Restorative Dentistry at the University of Pennsylvania School of Dental Medicine and the Department of Oral Biomaterials at the University of Texas in Houston. She lectures both nationally and internationally and has published numerous articles on the topics of occlusion and aesthetic restorations. “Understanding and Managing Older Adults in Your Practice”

Janet A. Yellowitz, DMD, MPH, FASGD, DABSCD

Dr. Yellowitz is the director of geriatric dental programs at the University of Maryland Dental School. She is a Diplomate of the American Board of Special Care Dentistry, a member of the education committee of the ADA’s Elder Care Task Force and provides care to community-based and long term care residents of a long term care facility. She was the president of the Special Care Dentistry Association (2008-2009) and the past-president of the American Society for Geriatric Dentistry (ASGD).

Older adult dental patients are a unique, heterogeneous group of individuals, often presenting with complex medical and cognitive conditions. Providing care to older adults can be easily facilitated with appropriate knowledge and skills. Key topics will include approaches to optimally address: age-related physical changes, recognizing and working with those with cognitive impairments and ensuring good quality care to older adults.

The participant will be able to:

- Recognize easy techniques to improve the outcome of an older adults’ dental visit
- Identify the impact of age-related physical and cognitive changes to older adults’ perception of oral health
- Recognize signs and symptoms of cognitive loss
- Understand management and treatment modalities when treating adults with cognitive changes
- Recognize approaches to ensure improved oral health to future elderly dental patients

“It’s Not Just Snoring Or Obstructive Sleep Apnea”

Norman Blumenstock DDS

Friday, May 4, 2012

Dr. Blumenstock earned his dental degree from Columbia University College of Dental Medicine, after earning his bachelor’s degree from Brooklyn College. Prior to entering private practice, he served a general practice residency at Montefiore Hospital and Medical Center in New York City. Dr. Blumenstock is an Assistant Clinical Professor at UMDNJ - Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, and on staff at the Dental Department of Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital.

- Learn when snoring may be just an annoyance, and when it might be the only signal of a life-shortening condition
- To be aware of the dentist’s role in diagnosing and treating sleep disordered breathing
- To learn how to screen for patients who should be referred for testing and diagnosis
- To gain knowledge of diagnostic techniques and devices
- To understand the pathophysiology that is involved in snoring and sleep apnea
- To gain an understanding of oral appliance therapy

Upon completion of this course, participants should be able to do the following:

- Discuss the significance of snoring.
- Discuss the significance of sleep apnea.
- Screen patients for obstructive sleep apnea.
- Communicate with sleep disorder centers.
- Make proper referrals to sleep disorder centers
- Fabricate the treatment appliance.

Learn to effectively manage the related medical insurance; identify the characteristics and common presenting symptoms of obstructive sleep apnea; explain the clinical consequences of obstructive sleep apnea including chronic diseases such as cardiovascular disease and type 2 diabetes mellitus; describe recent evidence-based recommendations for diagnosis of obstructive sleep apnea
